Justice for All envisions 100% access, where all D.C. residents facing civil legal problems have access to *some form* of effective legal help along a **continuum** of services so they get what they need, when and where they need it.

Activities for 2025-2026

- **Resource Development:** Redouble our efforts to expand public, private, and pro bono resources to support our civil justice system
- **Self-Help:** Support the launch of a centralized self-help approach in DC to ensure access to high-quality, user-friendly, and accessible self-help information, as detailed in our [Report on Self-Help in the District of Columbia and Recommendations for a More Efficient and Coordinated Future](#)
- **Coordinated Intake:** Serve as collaborators and champions of the DC Resource Bridge, including support for integrating self-help materials with coordinated intake
- **Policy:** Use the Commission's voice to strategically advance policies that improve access to justice, decrease the need for legal services, and benefit impacted communities
- **Navigation:** Promote new & expanded navigator programs that enable trained, supervised non-lawyers to help District residents without lawyers, including any community justice worker programs approved by the DC Courts
- **Community Integration:** Relaunch our work group to help community members identify, prevent, and resolve legal issues by connecting them with triage tools, self-help, DC Resource Bridge, community navigators, and other services
- **User engagement:** Ensure that the user experience is at the center of all civil justice planning efforts, including those described above
